Introduction

On behalf of the Live Oak District Camporee Committee – Welcome to the 2019 Live Oak District Camporee. The theme for this year's camporee is “**MacGyver School of Scouting**”, and we will have great Scout related activities and demonstrations. This Guide Book should help your Troop and Patrols come prepared for a weekend of FUN and EXCITEMENT. Please note there are some things that are new to Camporee this year, please be ready for them.

There are some patrol activities that will require pre-camp preparation, so please read through this guide for complete information.

Registration

- Registration is currently available and will remain so until April 26, 2019.
- Cost per participant is as follows:
 - \$10.00 per participant if registered on or before April 7
 - \$15.00 per participant if registered after April 7
- Webelos/Arrow of Light and their parents must be registered to participate with a hosting Troop.
 - Webelos/Arrow of Light Dens unable to find a hosting troop should contact their District Executive for assistance: Sara Parsons, [Live Oak District Executive](#), 559.732.3424
- At registration, you will be directed to your assigned campsite.
- As in any Scouting event, all units must have a minimum of two-deep leadership for the weekend.

Each attendee will enjoy:

- A weekend of camping at Plaza Park.
- Scouting activities on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.
- One rousing campfire.
- 2019 commemorative patch.
- Bragging rights for the year to come for top scorers.

Check In / Out

Arrival Procedures

- Plan to arrive at camp on Friday April 26 between 4:30pm and 9:30pm.
- The registration booth will be located between ball field 3 and 4 (see Appendix J- Site Map). The registration staff will direct you on where to park, receive your check in paperwork, and show you to your camping area.
- If you have a large amount of troop gear, proceed to the unloading area closest to your campsite. Unload your vehicle(s) as quickly as possible and immediately move all vehicles to the parking area.
- Campers should plan to carry in individual gear/backpacks
- For security reasons NO ADMITTANCE to the camp after 10:00pm will be allowed.

Check In Procedures

Upon arrival to camp, the SPL & an adult representative are asked to check in with registration. SPL's should have with them an accurate roster with names of all youth and adults attending (this will be turned in to staff). SPL's should also have copies of all units' medical forms, parts A&B, to show registration staff.

Adult representatives will be asked to pay outstanding registration fees once the SPL has checked in, please have payment ready.

Check Out Procedures

Saturday Check Out

Saturday checkout will be from 4:00pm to 6:00pm and will be of the same procedures as outlined below. Saturday check out will not be available before 4:00pm, please plan accordingly.

Sunday Check Out

- The SPL and a buddy should report to HQ & request an inspection.
 - Checkout will not commence until after closing flag ceremony.
- A runner will be sent to the unit's campsite and a final clearance will be issued.
- Once cleared, patches and outstanding awards will be given to the SPL.
 - Units will not be allowed to leave camp until final check out has been completed.

Individual Check out

Individuals wishing to check out separate from their units must sign out with both their Scoutmaster, as well as the registration staff. As a safety precaution youth will not be released without permission from the unit's scoutmaster.

Parking & Carpooling

- Units are encouraged to carpool as much as possible.
- Parking will be allowed in designated areas only.
- All vehicles must be backed in in accordance with BSA policy.
- Units with trailers will be required to unhitch trailers and park them in designated trailer parking areas.
- All vehicles must display a parking pass (Appendix C).
- Roads must remain clear at all times.

Health & Special Needs

Accessibility

Plaza Park is an accessible Facility.

There are wheelchair accessible restrooms located near the tennis courts. If additional accessibility needs are required, the health and safety team can make accommodations on case by case basis.

CPAP Users

- Participants with CPAP machines need to be able to run them from a battery as power is not guaranteed in any of the camping areas.
- The use of long extension cords into campsites will be prohibited.
- Generators are noisy and disrupting to the outdoor experience and will not be allowed at camp.
- Power will be available for battery charging in a designated area. The registration booth will have information on where that area is located.
- Batteries are heavy and cumbersome please plan for transportation needs accordingly.

Special Needs

Persons with special needs must include these in special needs field of the

registration form. Staff will do their best to accommodate all special needs if given at least 1 week notice.

Medical Forms

All participants must complete parts A&B of the BSA national medical form prior to arrival. Unit leaders, please bring copies of these medical forms, and plan to show them to registration staff upon arrival.

Medications

Medications with the exception of rescue devices such as inhalers and epinephrine **MUST** be kept in a secure locked box or in a unit leader's vehicle. If the unit is unable to properly secure medications they can be stored with the camp health officer.

Medical Facilities

The Camp Health Officer is a medical professional, and several key staff have advanced first aid training. These persons will be identified to leaders at the beginning of the event and will provide first aid on site for more advanced or serious injuries. As always minor first aid needs are the responsibility of the units. **All injuries & illnesses must be reported to the health officer regardless of severity.**

All medical emergencies must be reported to the Registration Booth.

****Arrangements have been made for emergency evacuations, if needed****

Safety

The safety of all participants is as the prime objective of this event. All participants are expected to refrain from unsafe activities and horseplay. Violence will result in being asked to leave the event. **Should you have an emergency report it to the registration booth.** They have radios and can call appropriate emergency services.

Event Rules / Expectations

- Youth and Adult Leaders are expected to provide all supervision of the scouts in their unit.
- The buddy system is to be used at all times.
- All campsites must be open. No ropes or fences.
- While activities are in progress, scouts will not be allowed in the campsite areas except for medical reasons.
- No liquid fuel lanterns will be allowed outside the campsite. Scouts should carry a flashlight rather than a liquid fuel lantern.
- No flames inside tents.
- Campfires must be raised off of the ground. No fires on the ground are permitted.
- Fishing will not be allowed during the event.

Commissioners

Event Commissioners will be responsible for event safety, security, parking, campsite inspections & other activities as directed. Please respect these scouts and follow their directions.

General Info

Headquarters

Camp headquarters will be located along Hangers Way (see map). Look for the feather flags that say “Check-In.”

Scouts

The Scout Law is the law of the Camporee. The Buddy System is to be used during the Camporee. No Scout may leave the Camporee site unless pre-arranged and approved by his Scoutmaster. As at any Scout activity, there will be no illegal drugs, alcohol, fireworks, or firearms and other weapons. Sheath knives and fixed-blade knives are also prohibited.

Uniform

Participants are expected to wear the Field Uniform (Class A) appropriate to their program to the following functions:

- Morning Flag
- Evening Flag
- Saturday night campfire program

At all other times Activity Uniforms (Class B) should be worn.

Campsite Assignments

Campsite locations and sizes will be assigned on site based on the most recent registration numbers.

LDS units wishing to camp together must contact the Camporee Registrar one week in advance.

Vehicles

Vehicles are not allowed on the grass at Plaza Park. If you need to drop off heavy equipment in your campsite speak with the Staff at the registration booth.

Water

You will need to bring your own water containers. “Be Prepared” and bring your water containers already full if possible. No dish washing is allowed at the water faucets or bathroom facilities. Each unit should have a wash station of some sort in their own campsite.

Cracker Barrel

Friday evening’s cracker barrel is for all SM’s, ASM’s and SPL’s. This will be an opportunity to meet the Camporee staff, receive a detailed schedule of events along with instructions, and an opportunity for questions to be answered. Make sure to leave adequate adult leadership in the campsite.

Campsites

Scouts are not to enter other campsites without permission. A Scout is Courteous, please be considerate of your campsite neighbors. Scouts must remain in their campsite after taps at 10:00 pm.

OA Callout

Callout for this year’s class of Order of the Arrow candidates will be done as part of the Saturday evening campfire. OA elections should be conducted under OA supervision prior to Camporee. No elections will be conducted at Camporee.

Saturday Activities

Saturday activities will be based on a range of scout skills, to that end each scout should have their 10 essentials with them in order to get the best possible experience. Each event will be scored, and 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place will be awarded to the winners.

Lost and Found

Please turn in lost and found items at the Camporee Administration area. Unclaimed items will be available at the Scout Office in Visalia after the Camporee and if not claimed, then they will be discarded or donated to charity.

Campsite Inspections

Judges will be visiting Campsites throughout the day on Saturday. The judges may visit your campsite several times during the day, so – "Be Prepared." Leave your site each time ready for an inspection.

Campfires

Campfires will be allowed in fire pans elevated off of the ground. There are no existing campfire rings, so please bring your own portable above ground fire containers. Ashes may not be dumped on the ground. In addition there will be one event wide campfire on Saturday night.

Pioneering Gadget Display

Every patrol is required to build and display a pioneering gadget in the Pioneering Gadget Display Area (see Appendix H). Gadgets will be judged on originality, soundness, lashing quality, and function. Points will go toward each patrol's overall score. Small patrols (<4) are encouraged to partner with a larger patrol for this event. Google Pioneering Gadget and look at all the examples. **This is the only item that can be built prior to the Camporee and brought with you to camp.** All other camporee gadgets/gateways must be built while at camp. Do your research beforehand and come prepared with a great idea. The gadget display area will be open to the public so build it big!

Dutch Oven Cooking Competition

Patrols will need to plan and create a Dutch oven dish (main or side dish) for their dinner Saturday night. Samples and dish name are to be brought to the front of the lodge to be judged by a blind taste test. Scoring will count towards overall competition score.

Water

Water will be available however scouting units should come prepared. Plan to bring large water carriers to carry water back to your campsites. Participants are **required** to have a personal water bottle or canteen for use during those times when they are out of camp.

The water stations & pavilions are not an acceptable area to clean dishes.

****Please use biodegradable soaps in an effort to lessen the impact on the park****

Cooking

Liquid fuel and propane stoves must be used in accordance with BSA policy on use of chemical fuels (Appendix A). **Propane is the preferred fuel.**

Leave No Trace

- Package food in easy to carry containers
- **Bring and use trash bags.**
- Minimize impact to the grass/ground.
- Dig no holes. No holes or trenches are to be dug for any purpose.
- Grease pits are not allowed.
- Waste water should be dumped away from the camping area
- Use tent stakes that are 6 inches or less to prevent damage to irrigation system.
- Plan meals to minimize cooking time, effort, and cleanup.
- Respect the rights of others. The Law of the Camp is the Scout Law, Scout Oath and the Outdoor Code, and will be enforced.

Top Troop

The *Top Troop* is awarded to the overall highest scoring unit at Camporee. With the award comes fame, honor, and bragging rights for the year to come!! Be warned, the journey will be arduous, and the competition steep. Good luck, and may the best unit win!

The scoring criteria for top troop will be available 1 week prior to the event. However, for those wishing to get a head start on their planning, listed below are a few criteria that will be included in the calculations.

Ribbons will be awarded for each event, First, Second and Third place. Prizes will also be awarded to the top Patrols in the overall Camporee scoring. All decisions of the judges are final.

Each participant, scout and adult will receive a patch, and each patrol will also receive a ribbon for their patrol flag.

Adult Activities

Dutch Oven Cook Off

There will be an adult leader Dutch Oven Cook Off. Leaders should bring everything they need to cook a meal. We will not be providing anything with the exception of hot coals. All Dutch Oven cooking will be in a central location identified on the map.

Hot charcoal will be provided.

A full set of rules will be available one week prior to the event.

Scoutmaster Archery Shoot Off

There will be a Scoutmaster Archery shoot off after youth activities have wrapped up for the day.

Scoutmaster Tug of War

Scoutmasters will be divided into two or more teams.

Appendix A – Policy on use of Chemical Fuels

Purpose

This policy directs Boy Scouts of America members how to safely store, handle, and use chemical fuels and equipment. Safety and environmental awareness concerns have persuaded many campers to move away from traditional outdoor campfires in favor of chemical-fueled equipment used for cooking, heating, and lighting. Be aware that chemical fuels and equipment create very different hazards than traditional wood, charcoal, and other solid fuels; this policy defines how to address those hazards.

Before any chemical fuels or chemical-fueled equipment is used, an adult knowledgeable about chemical fuels and equipment, including regulatory requirements, should resolve any hazards not specifically addressed within this policy.

Definitions

Chemical fuels—Liquid, gaseous, or gelled fuels.

Approved chemical-fueled equipment—Commercially manufactured equipment, including stoves, grills, burners, heaters, and lanterns that are designed to be used with chemical fuels.

Prohibited chemical-fueled equipment—Equipment that is handcrafted, homemade, modified, or installed beyond the manufacturer’s stated design limitations or use. Examples include alcohol-burning “can” stoves, smudge pots, improperly installed heaters, and propane burners with their regulators removed.

Recommended chemical fuels—White gas (Coleman fuel); kerosene; liquefied petroleum gas fuels, including propane, butane, and isobutane; vegetable oil fuels; biodiesel fuel; and commercially prepared gelled-alcohol fuel in original containers.

Chemical fuels not recommended—Unleaded gasoline; liquid alcohol fuels, including isopropyl alcohol, denatured ethyl alcohol, and ethanol; and other flammable chemicals that are not in accordance with the manufacturer’s instructions for chemical-fueled equipment.

Storing, Handling, and Using Chemical Fuels and Equipment

An adult knowledgeable about chemical fuels and equipment should always supervise youths involved in the storage, handling, and use of chemical fuels and equipment.

Operate and maintain chemical-fueled equipment according to the manufacturer’s instructions and in facilities or areas only where and when permitted.

Using liquid fuels for starting any type of fire—including lighting damp wood, charcoal, and ceremonial campfires or displays—is prohibited.

No flames in tents. This includes burning any solid, liquid, gel, or gas fuel—including tents or teepees that feature or support stoves or fires; and any chemical-fueled equipment or catalytic heaters.

Store chemical fuels in their original containers or in containers designed for immediate use. Securely store any spare fuel away from sources of ignition, buildings, and tents.

During transport and storage, properly secure chemical fuel containers in an upright, vertical position.

Why is this important?

In a review of internal and external burn incidents brought to our attention over several years, some trends were observed. These trends are a direct result of activities that are not a part of the BSA program and are inconsistent with the Policy on the Storage, Handling, and Use of Chemical Fuels and Equipment. Please don't put participants at risk by doing similar activities.

Serious and even fatal burns have been the result of the following: using diesel, kerosene, white gas, gasoline, alcohol, or charcoal lighter fluid as accelerants to start fires; use of black powder, pyrodex, or mixed chemicals as fire starters or displays; adding chemicals or alcohol-based products to fires for display purposes; using chemicals such as acetone in ceremonies; and creating or using homemade devices.

Appendix C – Sample Parking Pass

**This permit must be on your dash and readable by Camp Staff.
PLEASE OBSERVE 15 MPH IN CAMP**

- Drive Safely on ALL camp roads and observe speed limit of **15MPH**.
- No trailers/RVs in the camping area.
- Park your vehicle “**HEAD OUT**” in case of emergency evacuation.
- **DO NOT PARK OR LEAVE YOUR VEHICLE IN CAMP.**
- Vehicles may enter camp **ONLY** to load or unload gear.
- If you park blocking another car and the ranger or Camp Master cannot find you, it will be necessary to tow your vehicle.
- No “In and Out Parking” except for emergencies.
- The BSA is NOT RESPONSIBLE for items lost or stolen from vehicles.

Appendix D – Gateway Competition Rules

Must be Scout built – NO ADULT INTERFERENCE will be allowed!

Project: The Scouts are to design and build a gateway using wooden poles and rope. The opening should be at least 7 ft. above the ground and must be at least 36 inches wide to allow people to enter or exit unencumbered. There will be a minimum of 10 poles and a maximum of 40 poles total. All lashings and knots must be properly tied and have pigtails of 2 inches or less. Gateways shall be no taller than 10 ft. above the ground.

Units will supply their own materials. The gateway must be assembled at the Camporee. Hammer and nails, nuts and bolts or screws will disqualify the gateway. All joints must be lashed.

No work will be allowed after 10:00 pm on Friday night or before 6:00 am Saturday. All work must be completed no later than 8:30 am on Saturday morning. Violation of the time frames noted above will result in the gateway being disqualified from the competition.

We suggest that you design and practice assembling your gateway prior to the event so you will know how to put it together once you arrive at the Camporee. Scoring will be heavy on the originality of the design and the correct use of ropes, lashings, whippings. The gateway must be functional, but not necessarily practical. Have fun with it, but do not make this into a quest.

Scoring: The score will be based on originality, visual appeal, best and correct utilization of material, but more importantly, construction should be obviously safe and sound. Simplicity of design has been a goal in more than one previous camporee. Not this time, **Get creative, make the gateway that you always wanted to make!!**

Judging: Judging will be during the morning inspection period beginning at 9:30 am on Saturday. This will be a team independent of the Campsite judging team.

Note: The gateway competition is for all units and will be part of top campsite scoring. Adult assistance or interference will cause disqualification and remove the Troop from the gateway competition.

Appendix E – Patrol Flag Competition

Patrol Flag Competition: Each patrol from the troop should submit a flag for judging. Flags will be judged on the following criteria:

Originality of design: The flag can be made of any shape; round, square, diamond, etc. and any material. Must be attached to a staff or pole of not less than 5 feet (60 inches) high.

Suitability: The flag is to go wherever the patrol goes. It must be easily carried.

Workmanship: The flag must be home made by the boys. No sheet metal.

Points and Scoring (Maximum in each category):

Shape	5 Points	Flag must be within the size limits.
Name	3 Points	Flag must have patrol name, emblem, and troop number.
Mounting	5 Points	Flag is mounted on a pole at least 60 inches long and is suitable for carrying.
Pole	5 Points	Pole is decorated.
Originality	2 Points	Original design
Theme (Extra Credit)	10 Points	Flag incorporates the camporee theme.

Flags will be judged at one of the event stations during the program time. The exact station will be announced Saturday morning.
